DAPPER LADIES & GENTLEMEN ASSEMBLE



It was a fantastic day, and everybody looked incredible. Our ride was the most ambitious to date, consisted of 40 miles with around 130 bikes on the day. The sound was fantastic as we bimbled along the roads, through Mears Ashby, Sywell, Holcot, with a regroup on Pitsford Causeway. Then on to Spratton through Welford for our second regroup, before heading to the A5 and north to Hinckley, home of the Triumph factory.

As I'm sure you know, this is a charity ride to raise funds and awareness for men's mental health and prostate cancer research. **The Northampton DGR alone has so far raised over £8860.** There were 104,272 riders globally, with 893 rides across 107 countries.

Well done and thank you to everyone. Triumph also had on the day, spot prizes winners, and our very own Linda was a winner and was presented with a prize, well done to her.

So, on behalf of the DGR team a massive thank you to all of the riders involved in this year's Distinguished Gentleman's Ride. Next year's date for the 2024 Distinguished Gentleman's Ride is Sunday May 19th, let the countdown begin.



YORVIK BRANCH TRIP

YORVIK BRANCH - ROUTE 66 SPRING RAMPAGE TRIP



Alan and Sue Price, Geoff Davies, Paul Humphreys and myself, attended this years event, held by the TOMCC Yorvik Branch, at Greta Bridge, County Durham.



The weekend trip resulted in riding the bike just over 600miles, in what turned out to be splendid sunshine, not normally typical of the Yorkshire Dales and North Penines, at this time of year.

The event was based from the Morritt Arms Hotel, located in the Penine Hills close to Barnard Castle.

A calendar of daily events was created by the Yorvik team, with the monies from fundraising efforts being donated to the local branch of Blood Bikes. A total of almost £1000 was raised and presented before departure.

Day 1 - Ride up, travelling the latter part, through the South and East parts of the Yorkshire dales, arrivals and catch up at Hotel, with charity dinner, followed by presentation by volunteers from Blood Bikes





Day 2 - Ride out, just over 120miles, through East Cumbria and South West through the Yorkshire dales, returning via Tan Hill Inn (the highest pub in England) over the moors, being careful to dodge the sheep, back to the Hotel. Evening dinner, followed by "Quiz night" which resulted in me getting a score of 8/40 from the two rounds. There was some questions bias - Yorkshire related. The evening closed with a charity raffle, with yours truly winning bike lube and an event T shirt (specially made).





Day 3 - Ride out, again around 100 miles, through the North Penines and North West towards Cumbria. Out past Hamsterly Forest and Deep Dale resevoir, and through Teesdale. Spectacular scenery and culture on return, stopping off at Raby Castle and the Moor House Museum in Barnard Castle. The Yorvik team stopped off at Stanhope for Viking adventures which included Axe Throwing. Evening dinner to wind down, ready for the ride home.



"Are we on the right bl**dy road" he asks. I reply, "I don't know mate, you're leading



TIGERS ON TOUR



FIRST RIDING TRIP ABROAD!

After much debate whether to do Channel Tunnel, Portsmouth of Plymouth ferry, largely due to my extreme dislike of ferries, we opted to try a shortish hop to Caen via Portsmouth. It was a chance to get away for a short break, a chance to ride abroad, and a very nervy chance to see if I could overcome the ferry issue.

Cheeky little hotel booked in Caen city centre, ferries booked, we'd prepared the bikes (Tiger & Speed Twin) for an evening jolly down to Portsmouth ready for an early morning ferry. Bikes packed, gear on, Speed Twin- which is only 5 months old did not want to start! It gurgled, fired then died. No issues with power, no issues with it turning over, just 3-4 seconds of running before it died again.

The bike had been ridden to refuel just 2 days prior, turned over at lunchtime that day, but at 1830hrs it was not our best friend. Quick turnaround of bikes, run inside to change the V5 and the Rally Pro was ready to go. We've still got the Himalayan so it wouldn't have been a major disaster, but of course when you're all geared to go and your new bike is playing up, it kind of puts a downer on the start of the trip.

Wednesday night down to the coast, then ferry first thing. We'd booked a cabin for an extra few quid, so we'd have somewhere to relax properly rather than share the lounge with others. This turned out to be my godsend, no sickness, comfy bed (even if I was on top bunk), ensuite shower & toilet and several hours of catch-up kip ready for the off in France.

We arrived in France, just 20 minutes away from our hotel and the first intercom chat was, "stay left, stay left" which to be fair, is much easier on a bike.

For those who have never been, Caen is a relatively small but beautiful city. With over 70% of the city being rebuilt since the damage of the WWII, many of the historic buildings remain, with the castle dominating the city centre. We managed to get a cheeky little hotel just 60 seconds walk from the marina where most of the bars & restaurants are, and although our hotel didn't have dedicated parking (even though the website said it did), we were fortunate enough to linger around to get a parking slot right outside the hotel. The red zone parking areas are free for the first hour, only remain for 2 hours, and no return during the day, restriction enforced between 0900 & 1700hrs Mon-Sat. Thankfully we were up and away before 9.30 every morning, and back after 1600hrs every day, with Sunday being our stay local and mooch day.

Thank you Mr Swann for being gracious enough to provide some details of interesting sites in the area, and once we'd familiarised ourselves with town, decided on the following ride outs.





MONT-SAINT-MICHEL

About an hour and a half away from Caen staying off the motorway, the ride there was great. Beautiful scenery, great roads, and fantastic weather. Mont-Saint-Michel UNESCO world heritage site and a tidal island and mainland commune in Normandy, France. The island lies approximately one kilometre off the country's north-western coast, at the mouth of the Couesnon River near Avranches and is 7 hectares in area. The Abbey is as tall as it is wide and the journey to the top is an epic adventure. The tight lower alleyways look like Diagon Alley from Harry Potter, with loads of goodies shops, bars, and restaurants. Little passageways take you off into alternate nooks & crannies around the site, with the main pathway leading to the abbey at the top. It's a trek!!! With a few breath capturing stops along the way, we got to the top and sat in the amazing main area of prayer. Littered with historical artefacts

and references to the Bayeux Tapestry, it's worth a visit if you like that sort of thing. The journey down is harder!! Narrow stairwells with short treads and only a few with handrails make the journey down far more precarious. Lots of pain killers and the promise of a beer made the steep decent much easier to bear.

You could well spend an entire day at the Abbey, moving from bar to bar and taking your time, but if truth be told. We'd have been in no fit state physically or mentally after a few cheeky sherbets.

It's well worth the trip but be mindful that weekends and bank holidays get super busy.

BAYEUX TAPESTRY

Day 2 was another busy day, Bayeux first, then along the D-Day beaches.

Bayeux is only half an hour away from Caen, so if you wanted to you could make the ride there much longer taking in some of the beautiful countryside and plethora of cafes in the local villages and towns. We didn't really mooch around the town of Bayeux, just popped in to see the tapestry. At approx. 70m long, this snapshot of history is outstanding. The mini tour with audio support walks you through the story told on the tapestry and fills in lots of blanks in the well-known tale. The museum above is equally fascinating and provides further evidence of the battle and the journey the tapestry has been on in the last 1,000 years.

Again, be warned, get there at the start of the day or face the congestion of loud Americans! The place was quiet when we arrived, but the square was full of large groups as we departed.

D DAY BEACHES & MEMORIALS

On the same day we travelled up the coast and around the D-Day beaches. A somber tour of what can only be described as truly humbling. We stopped off at the American Memorial and Omaha Beach, which by any standard is amazing. Perfectly manicured and laid out and very worth the visit.

Not too far round the coast after many a small memorial or war relic, is the British Memorial. A stark contract to that of our US brethren, not as well kept, not as glitzy with pomp or ceremony, but very humbling and perfectly pitched as a dedication to those who fought, and those who lost their lives. In all honesty, you could spend a week just mooching about all the small memorials stopping off at cafes on the route. There's always something that catches your eye that could lead you off another a totally unplanned route.







In the city of Caen, you have the amazing castle facing a very decorative church, both well worth a visit. There's also the resting place of William the Conqueror, the Abbey of Saint-Étienne, also known as Abbaye aux Hommes by contrast with the Abbaye aux Dames, is a former Benedictine monastery in the French city of Caen, Normandy, dedicated to Saint Stephen. It was founded in 1063 by William the Conqueror and is one of the most important Romanesque buildings in Normandy.

PEGASUS BRIDGE

Not too far out of the city is the Airborne Memorial at Pegasus Bridge, the first house to be liberated from the D-Day landings in now a café next to the bridge and houses some truly inspiring and

very sad memories of those who landed. The memorial is just the other side of the bridge and although it costs about 9€ per person, it's well worth the history lesson.

All in all, a great trip, the bikes performed admirably and didn't miss a beat, the weather was incredible (burnt knees to prove it) and the history lesson whilst ripping around on mostly silky-smooth French roads was brilliant.

When can we go again??
