This year I was privileged to lead the ride out from Pure Triumph leaving promptly at 9.45am with our contingent. I rode it to check out for closures, roadworks and any other impediments a few days in advance of the event.

Satisfied that all was well and with clear skies we set off through Irchester, Wollaston and into Bedfordshire heading South on very minor roads, passing through Turvey, (is there a Topsy anywhere)? and tiny villages with charming names such as Newton Blossomville for the 25 mile run. After overnight rain the road surfaces were in surprisingly good condition.

Our group were first to arrive at the village hall (by chance? I think not), where the volunteer staff dressed in their green Macmillan T shirts were clearly prepared to deal with our voracious appetites and we were soon sitting in the sunshine stuffing our faces and chatting away as is our normal manner.

I take my hat off to the efforts made by the villagers in this small community who so selflessly undertake this challenge every year even during the Covid period. I was told that in 2022 the sum raised exceeded £6,800.00 a fantastic amount from a single 'stand-alone' event and well done to all at TOMCC.

TONY'S BIRTHDAY OFF ROAD TIGER **ADVENTURE STORY**

DATE OF RIDE 29/09/2023

After owning a Tiger explorer from 2013 to 2020 a Gen 1 model as they are now called, I always fancied doing the Triumph adventure 1 day off road experience to see what the bike could really do, but something always got in the way. The cost, the fear of falling off on granite, I did contemplate riding my own bike at one stage but then again, the fear of the cost for damaged parts put me off again. So, I never got around to it and then for my big 60th birthday a few of my friends / very good riding mates chipped in and treated me to the day out.

With the day booked earlier in the year for Friday the 29th sept and researching the venue which is 15 miles from Swansea, and the day starting at 8am, a two day hotel break was booked in Ystradgynlais (a place I can't pronounce) to my pillion Elaine's delight who then giving it some thought as she does, she suggested we take her car just case I fall off and broke a bone and couldn't ride or drive home, I didn't do either!

We left on Thursday taking the A roads to Hereford where we stopped for lunch and a quick stroll around to stretch our legs, then again back on the A roads to the hotel The Ynyscedwyn Arms another name I can't pronounce.

So we arrived at the hotel and headed for the bar to check in and was asked to wait 5 minutes where we get talking to a guy from Manchester who we noticed was wearing a triumph T-shirt, and his wife. It turned out Mark happened to be on the same adventure bike day as me (he rides a black speed triple) with his wife Lisa who had by chance been walking their dog and decided to pop into our hotel bar for drink and dinner about the same time we arrived.



The girls got talking and arranged to meet for lunch the next day, so Elaine had company in the afternoon after her walks around the village in the morning, and Mark who offered to pick me up and drive to venue, so it works out well. The Triumph family eh.

Mark was prompt and keen to get there on Friday morning, being the last pair to arrive at 8.05 the rest of the guys were just as keen.

I must say this is not a cheap day out, some £310 for the day plus I opted to hire all the riding attire for an extra £60 paid on the day.

The day starts with the usual signing in and driving license check with free coffee whilst waiting.

Then a tour around the facilities, into the changing room where there is a locker with my name on, with all the kit for riding off road in my size which I had ordered when making the booking consisting of starting from the bottom up, a pair of off road boots a set of shin and knee amour, light weight trousers, a zip up body armour vest with elbows, shoulders, and a back plate, over this was a triumph off road lightweight shirt and this was all covered in a two piece rain suit. We use our own crash helmet.

By now I'm dressed, and the sweat is rolling down my cheeks, both sets 😊 😉 .





From the changing room we then ventured into the carpark where we met our instructors for the day and our trusty steeds are the Triumph 900s, all lined up with our names on the screen and a bottle of water strapped under a pair of Rok straps on the pillion seat.



Keith our lead instructor welcomed everybody and introduced himself and the rest of the team for the day. Hank would ride middle of the pack and Sam taking up tale end Charlie position.

All 3 were riding the 1200 shaft drive Triumph Tiger explorers for the day.

After a quick introduction to our bikes for the day we had time for fine adjustments to the brake, clutch levers and seat height if need be. I did change mine for a low seat being short legged.

Keith said we would be using the drop off system in and around town, he also mentioned to give the sheep a very wide birth when passing and not to ride to close to each other as they tend to turn around and run back across the road into the oncoming rider.

There were eight riders and three instructors for the day and a fourth man Matt in the support van with a spare bike just in case, it wasn't needed! We left the Adventure center around 9am and were soon getting the feel of the bikes now riding a few miles on the roads around town as I'm settling in and getting comfortable on the bike and looking up after checking my mirrors and speed as you do.

I spot this woman on my left in the distance walking very fast, well faster than the normal person, strange I thought for this early in the morning and I got closer I recognized her, it was my mad wife Elaine out for a yomp as I call it. So after a toot and a wave going by, we head into the

valley and very soon we turn off the main road to start climbing up the hillside on single track roads between fields and through farms and at one stage getting a very short chase with a loud bark from the farmer's dog.

My first taste of the water should we say.

Before I know it, it's 10.30 and were pulling into a country layby where Matt had set up the support vehicle ready for a short coffee break out the back of the van. This was a very welcome rest on the legs to get off the bike and we had just been practicing standing up riding across some gravel tracks giving us a chance to get Keith to go over his standing up instruction from earlier, legs bent, arm bent, soft grip on the bars, don't lean too far forward, chest in line with petrol cap on tank, feet not too far forward on the pedals so you can reach the brake and gear change..

After coffee and a comfort break watering the trees, we were soon heading back up the Brecon mountains where Keith took us over an old Roman road which had now become a rough track and worse in places with deep water filled gulley's.

Now I was glad for Keith's advice on standing up and the big off-road boots with waterproof trousers to keep my feet and legs dry going through the deep rock gulley's.

Me up to the knees in it

The next stage was riding through the deep tractor ruts where you had to choose the left or right wheel rut and scoot along riding and using your legs to walk you through at pace, again, trickier than you think. We carried on riding through the rocky road which is like a dry riverbed where before in the water you could not see the rocks, you just wait for the bounce of the handlebars and hoped for the best, that you stayed upright and didn't get a wet A***!

Now your eyes are fixed on every stone which felt like a rock and every rock felt like bolder and every boulder felt like a mountain, ok not quite a mountain, but you know what I mean with the rocking and the movement of the handlebars was enough to make your teeth chatter on top the nervous sweat running down your face.

Keith and the guys talked through and showed us how to do it on the bigger 1200 bikes and they made it look so bloody easy. To them it was just another day, for me, a cross between tension and first-time nerves.

So after a quite substantial lunch of a fresh made sarnie, small pasta pot, packet of crisps, banana, flapjack biscuit, and a bottle of water and Matt putting the kettle on again for coffee as well.

We were ready for the Rocks and rocky road ahead, we hadn't gone long when Keith pulled us all over for further instructions on how to ride down the rocks and refreshing our minds on the standing up procedure and adding will be using the stop and go, for this to space the riders out. With Sam at the top, Keith would go first and park up and walk back half way up to guide and point out the best line to take, with Hank near the bottom of the run for final guidance and to give the all clear to Sam.

The last piece of advice given was, when starting off let the bike ease into first gear and roll off using yours and the bikes weight, to control the bike only using the rear brake to slow down and control the bike. This sounds simple, I can do that I'm thinking, on a full belly, then I'm thinking, well if this goes T*t's up I won't be hungry.

So off we go on the rocky road, a dry riverbed type with trees hanging over from either side and the bike soon picking more speed than I would have liked, with the ever changing rocky road there was no track to follow for ease, and with the overhanging tree branches coming thick and fast at you, I'm trying to duck and weave and it seems every time I duck down we hit a rock and I bounced up just missing tree branches, I think you could have seen the whites of my eyes through my dark screen visor, if you could have seen the look on my face.

At this point I released my right foot was too far forward and the lower engine bars were stopping me from finding the rear brake and the front of my foot is tapping thin air, at this point the Oh s**t thought running through my very taught face being too nervous to lift my foot up and ride one legged to reposition. This leaving me no choice but to grab a handful of front brake.

The bike dipped as Keith said it would and I luckily came to a stop and stalled the bike on a large right angled turn crack in the landscape, I was just about holding to the bike upright and where I did manage to straighten myself and look up there was a tree branch of about 3 inches in diameter right in front of my nose horizontally inline with my screen, a lucky one there I thought to myself,

with no time to stop I found neutral and off we go again to a long run of decent over the rocks.

Keith the instructor was already parked and off his bike by the time we all pulled up with him gesturing us to gather a little closer, we rolled forward and turned the engines off, my second mistake of the day. After our final repeated instructions about descending rocks and using the back brake ONLY I find myself being in P1 for the decent run, the second time in a few minuets the Oh s**t thought went through my mind.

So here I am at the top looking down what seems like a very long steep run, the instructor Sam is holding me back (it doesn't take a lot) from going whilst Keith takes up his guidance position.

I'm now remembering what Keith said at the beginning of the day, if anybody doesn't fancy any of the obstacles, they would ride the bike for us just hold your hand up, a big comes across my face then realize I can't do that. What would the others think of me? So now I'm at the top of the decent with the weight of the bike tipping down and I'm holding it back on the front brake, I'm also in first gear holding the clutch in with my other hand with Sam patting me on my back to go as Keith is now waving and pointing out to me the line to follow. At this point I realized there are no tracks on a large rocky terrain.

Off I go following what think he's pointing at, after a few meters down and bouncing around I glance up at Keith only to see him waving and patting downwards with both hands, ok slow down I'm now thinking and remember to use the back I said myself, only to find my foot with its large size 11 off road boot only to be too far forward again to find the back brake again.

I've left myself no choice but to use the front brake again. I'm lucky I've managed to slow down enough for Keith to stop waving his arms at me, I pass him on my right-hand side, I'm now halfway down and I can see Hank beckoning me on and pointing at the line to take to the bottom of the run, I'm there I've made it, I'm on lose gravel now, what a solid feeling!

That was probably one of the longest 5 seconds ride of my life ② I park up and watch the other guys nervously wait to take their turn to come down.

Now looking back up the granite rock it didn't look that steep and there is a sort of line to take so I'm saying to myself, what was all the fuss about as I'm swiping the sweat off my brow.

All the guys managed to run down the slope with no off's and a big well done to all from Keith and him say that's the hardest bit now done for the afternoon.

Well you've never seen 8 nervous faces turn to happy smiley \circ in an instance.

We now head off back onto single track tarmac roads over the mountains heading for the military roads as Keith called them. Apparently we are going on the edge of a MOD firing range where in the distance we can see a mock east Germany village built in the 60s.

We're soon on some of the smoothest tarmacked mountain roads you'll find in Wales. We stop at the end of the MOD range to allow Matt to get into position to take some more drone footage for their FB page.

We set off now homeward bound and again I find myself in P2 following Keith heading down the mountains. I now get the sense Keith was having a little me time and was quite relaxed by the speed we were picking up, not over the limits but a very fluid ride using his local knowledge of the sweeping and twisting single track roads down the mountain.

We pull in at the bottom and he jumps off his bike stating we're just wait for the rest of the group to catch up before hitting the main A road back to base.

I told him how much I enjoyed that last bit of road just keeping him in my sights, he nodded and said I guess so as you never left my mirrors, I

We did see a few 20mph road signs, but they seemed to be on side roads we never used.

And guess who we saw and passed yomping along just down the road from the adventure center on our return Yes that mad woman I know and love Elaine.

Arriving back at the center we pulled into the carpark for a debrief, feed back of the day, and a round of applause for each individual when collecting their riders' attendance certificate and then a group photo. Keith said the ride was about 100miles with 20miles of that off road for an adventure taster day.



After drop off at the last roundabout and last in, they chose me and my bike for the team photo.

After a hot shower I headed back to my hotel where I met the yomping woman who claimed to have worked up a large wine thirst where we sat for a couple of hours chatting about our day.

I hadn't plan to stay that long at the bar, but the beer tasted good the seats were comfy and my bones were aching a little

It was a great day, the staff and the facilities were great, and our instructors for the day Keith, Hank, Sam were fantastic nothing was to much trouble from the moment you arrived until you left.

Matt who was running it for the day and drone pilot and support van, coffee and lunch provider and lastly, thanks to the mechanic guy whose name I can't remember who swapped the seat on the bike for a low one.

Overall, when you add it all up for the day £310, along with the kit hire of £60 (you could use your own kit) it is a lot of money.

But when you see what you get for your money, in my opinion it's worth it.

And finally, the Triumph Tiger 900 bikes run faultlessly with no issues and with only one rear broken indicator lens cover missing for the day (not on my bike). They can't complain too much.

RALLYING IN SUNNY SOMERSET

MORE FUN ON TWO WHEELS



Those who find their fun on two wheels have through motorcycling unwittingly joined a fraternity and although I make a wild assumption it is something easier to get into than to get out of. Those who do, as far as I can tell are usually forced out of it by old age, infirmity or the 'Grim Reaper' himself, if indeed it is not herself in these modern enlightened times.

There is such a lot to see in the UK but I have been known to wander abroad across the herring pond to visit our kindred in Europe. Sometime ago I joined a group of Brits riding into France to participate in a biker's rally in the centre of that fair land. Since then, I have been back quite a few times always to a different location but meeting up with the same group of enthusiasts, some French some Germans, a couple of Irish and even a Belgian thrown in for good luck. The French rallies are always held over 4 days starting on Ascension Day (6 weeks after Easter) and they are so well organised as to put greater gatherings to shame.

Back in the UK there is a 'home' match that happens in the second week in September with 2023 being the first time this could happen since the scourge of Covid put a stop to nearly everything except Downing Street parties.

Some readers of Vibrations may remember my earlier article, 'Camping for Beginners' and my floundering to learn the ropes, at times literally, of living under canvas. Now with the passage of time and graduation to a better tent I can actually say I am enjoying it but twice a year is probably enough for those not accustomed to spending their holidays crawling around on hands and knees.

This year after a cracking break in France, staying in the Pas de Calais last May, it was time to consider September and the delights of Somerset. This year the dates chosen for the home match were 7th to 10th September. So it was with some glee that I had loaded up the bike with all the camping essentials and headed off for Tuckers Grave Inn near Frome, deep into cider country.





It was going to be a relatively cheap stay with my ninety-five guid buying me 3 nights camping including 3 breakfasts and 3 dinners. All pretty basic meals but reasonable fare, nothing fancy.

At Tuckers Grave Inn they press and ferment their own cider, some of which is quite palatable and others as rough as the rear end of a Badger (so they tell me). However, I took a liking to a brew called 'Mind yer 'Ed' which at 6.5% lived up to its name. Caution is the watch word if you are going to be riding the bike the following day!

We had an organised ride out on Friday for 70 miles with about 60 riders in convoy first to view the impressive White Horse carved into the hillside at Bratton Camp, Wiltshire visible from Westbury and then on to National Trust property Stourhead House and its famous gardens. The weather was stinking hot so I didn't feel the need to wander far in my leathers and in truth never got much further than the ice cream shop.

There are plenty of places to stay in the area, more details of the event can be found in the


