He even borrowed some of the vintage bikes to ride over the Trials course. Really showed us what they could do in the right hands and well worth watching.

It was made even better this year by having a base to return to for a good natter and a nice shady place to sit when it got too hot. Lovely to spend time with all those who went and gave us a chance to get to know you all a bit better.

A NEW WORLD RECORD!

TRIUMPH HINCKLEY HOSTED THE WORLD'S LARGEST FEMALE BIKER MEET ON 24TH JULY 2022

July saw me finally back on my bike having recovered from breaking my ankle earlier in the year. Thank goodness, just in time for to join the World Record attempt for the World's Largest Female Biker Meet at Triumph Hinckley.

On a cool and slightly drizzly morning Mark and I set off to join women who travelled from all across the globe for this momentous occasion. Gentlemen and family members were welcome as supporters to the event but didn't count towards the numbers, only female riders on bikes were counted. Not a fan of being late we pulled up a few minutes before the gates opened, managing to come in 55th in the rapidly growing queue. I took my place sticker and displayed it on my screen with pride and headed into the parking area.

We were all on tenterhooks, could we beat the previous world record of 1132 female bikers gathered together. We settled down to some expensive but really



awesome fish and chips and waited. At around mid-day a cheer rang out as the 1000th bike crossed the gates.

Then it wasn't long to wait until an even bigger cry rang out as the 1133rd female biker arrived and the existing world record was broken. But the numbers kept on rising, bikes of every kind, from 125's on L plates and scooters, trikes and every make and model. Every bike above and beyond the 1132 was congratulated as being the new record holder. By the end of the allotted time allowed, we had smashed the previous record with a total of **1549 women riders** attending.



We also raised £9000, to be split equally between the Leicestershire and Rutland Blood Bikes and Midlands Air Ambulance charities.

Thanks to everyone who supported this great event!

Due to the Covid crisis last year the organisers were obliged to change their regular format and adopt the one given below which has been retained for this year.

It is a very friendly event and does a great deal of good for the charity. I personally look forward to riding with our group from Pure Triumph on Friday 30th September.

We are planning our usual annual event and we will continue the format from last year which was different to previous as we were curtailed by having to be outside, however the logistics worked really well.

We will be serving drinks and hot rolls (bacon/sausage/egg) plus our usual amazing home made cakes, raffle, giving tree etc;

Eating inside the village hall or on benches outside if the weather is kind - we will seek permission from the Swan to use their tables/benches, but this has yet to be confirmed.

Also as per last year we will be splitting the total donations 50/50 with MacMillan Nurses and Action Against Cancer - AAC is very close to our hearts as our very dear friend and neighbour Cat has battled cancer for 11+ years - she would not be here without the treatments and support they have provided, they are 99% volunteers which means 99p in every £1 goes to funding research compared to MacmIllan whereby 73p in the £1 goes towards charitable work (correct as at today) - you can read more here if you wish.

Also worth noting that AAC research is fed to all other cancer charities, so an exceedingly valuable charity.

THE GRAND TOUR

LANDS' END TO JOHN O'GROATS & BACK PART 2

Day two proper was a route along the North Devon Coast visiting the fishing village of Boscastle, now recovered from the devastating floods of 18 years ago, then on to Clovelly for the steep downhill walk and lung busting scramble back up to where the bikes were parked having paid £8.50 for the privilege of our efforts, and it had started to rain as we continued our ride to a Best Western hotel near Cheddar where there was a huge wedding in progress. So much for a quite night we thought but to our great delight it was absolutely peaceful.

Our first Sunday was here and our target was Hayfield on the Staffordshire side of the Peak District where we stayed at the Royal Hotel, an absolutely fabulous hotel/pub with a garage for the bikes all at a very affordable price and a superb Italian restaurant more or less next door for those who appreciate Mediterranean cuisine.

Monday morning and the weather is promising for a ride into Castleton taking the stunning Wynatts Pass en-route and on to the Lady Bower reservoir before returning then to face the horrors of the motorway system around Manchester heading for Lake Windermere and Boness. After relaxing with a hot chocolate drink we take a narrow mountain road in between stone walls and passing places following the shore of Ullswater to our Guest House destination in Penrith. Wetherspoons for dinner so nothing to write home about but the hosts at the guest house were from Sri Lanka and were friendly and helpful.





Tuesday and we are heading for Scotland stopping off at Ye Olde Blacksmith's Shoppe and Rippe Offe emporium at Gretna Green, thankfully the visit was quite brief and we continue our journey towards Crianlarich and our beds for the night in isolated Ineshewan farmhouse slap bang in the middle of nowhere. We had to make a short ride out for a couple of miles to get dinner (strictly cash only) but the food was reasonable quality and at least it was dry weather.

Time is whizzing by and it is Wednesday 6th July as we set off for Gairloch riding through the marvellous Highland scenery, and guess what? Its' pouring with rain!! Nothing for it but to hunker down and dig into the ride just stopping for the briefest of spells to take a few pictures of the beautiful Glen Coe which were partly swathed in rain clouds. Wetherspoons at Fort William was a welcome hot chocolate stop and a lunch stop at Ullapool, the only breaks in a soggy day. The

imposing Commando Memorial at Spean Bridge also in the rain

We are making good progress and on target with our programme and Thursday is a much better day. A 143 mile run to Bourgie Lodge Hotel near Tongue and at last we are on the North Coast of the British mainland. The approach to the North Coast from the centre of the Highlands takes us through some of the most desolate scenery one could imagine as we follow the single track A836 for forty miles. The surface is good in the centre of the track and broken at the edges so care is required but at times reasonable speeds are achievable (in the dry).

Our second Friday, hard to think that a week has passed so quickly but today is the day when we reach the top and turn the corner to start heading South again. Make a brief visit to one of the many whisky distilleries, it appears to be a new place and the staff are indifferent to us so we quickly move on and leave the coast





road heading up to Dunnet Head actually the most Northerly point of the British Mainland. A bird watchers paradise and a procession of tourists visiting the marker stone.

THE NEXT STOP IS JOHN O'GROATS - WHATEVER YOU WERE EXPECTING YOU'RE GOING TO BE DISAPPOINTED.

We are heading South and I am a little sad that we are now on the return leg staying the night at Helmsdale in the comfortable Kindale Guest house.

Saturday 9th July, flying South like the swallows along the A9 that is a real road but with average speed cameras on most of it. The weather is good and the roads are good, we are in the Cairngorms and the scenery is stunning in places. Not very busy and there is fun ahead as we enter Inverness. I have been persuaded that my motard (French for Biker) friends want to see Loch Ness so following 'Nora the Navigator' we head through the city and as I leave Inverness I

glance in my mirrors and discover that I am on my own!

I reverse route and after a couple of phone calls we are reunited and they were easier to find than Nessie who was decidedly shy on the day. Afterwards a short visit to the Culloden field where Scotland lost another home game to the English back in 1746. It is a smooth run to Kingussie and another comfortable night at the Hermitage guest house that offers such luxuries as smoked salmon and poached eggs for breakfast cooked to order. There is a limit to how many full English/Scottish breakfasts that you can actually 'enjoy'.



It's getting to be really hot on Sunday but a relatively short 3 hour



brisk ride to Edinburgh with a brief stop to admire the marvelous Forth bridges at Queens Ferry and so to the Cumberland Hotel, close to Murrayfield. Very helpful staff allow us to leave our luggage in the lounge as the rooms aren't ready yet and get cleaned up before taking the bus into the city for a very pleasant couple of hours enjoying the sights and bustle of this vibrant place.

Monday 11th July and our destination is Whitby back in England and a famous seaside town with reputedly the best Fish & Chips in the land. We stayed at the Penny Hedge, Marstons chain hotel so it was a cab ride to the Abbey and a stroll down the 199 steps into the town and its evening attractions but our principal

target was Hadleys Fish & Chip restaurant which did not disappoint in any way.

Tuesday, the last day on the road as a group had arrived too quickly and on check out we rode to Robin Hoods Bay for a little looksee and another lung busting climb back up to the car park. It was cooler and a hint of rain but as we were so close we made a visit to Goathland (TVs Heartbeat) which is full of chubby tourist eating ice creams and wandering sheep.

I was pleased to see home after nearly a fortnight away and being proud of my county lead my motards through some of the pretty local villages in our most beautiful county to their Guest House at Aldwincle (which does not feature in the Pint of Beer challenge).



After such a memorable tour we had just one more pleasurable event and visited the Montague Arms, Barnwell (does feature in the PoB Challenge) where we could relive our experiences in the company of my ever tolerant wife Margaret.

REFLECTION:

It was overall an interesting and very satisfying trip all the more so to spend time with guys who had a similar sense of humour and motivation. The camaraderie of these guys and among the folks we met along the way who were all genuinely interested in what we were doing.

I would have much preferred not to be injured at the start of the ride but my condition greatly improved as the ride progressed and I am satisfied that I made the right decision to go ahead with it.

The time constraints made the ride very intense with barely time to look around and take stock and I think it would have been better with a rest day or two. Somehow or another I managed to finish the trip more or less on budget even allowing for the massive hike in fuel prices. It was a smart move to pre-book all of the accommodation so we were not wandering around looking for somewhere to stay at the end of each days' ride.

I have not set out to give all the events throughout the tour but I am happy to answer any questions from our experiences if anyone is interested.

EVENT TIMING

You have until December 2022 to complete the challenge. It's up to you whether you do it all in one day or over a number of rides. If you have more than one Triumph then you can use different machines for different sections.

2) Fill in the membership form that was sent to you, then post it direct to the HQ Membership address at Horley, as shown on the form. Include a cheque made payable to Triumph Owners MCC.

3) Fill in the membership form and hand it to the Branch Membership Secretary at a club night. Payment by cheque or cash. Memberships renewed this way are only sent to HQ a couple of times a month, so will take longer to process than 1 or 2 above.

Don't worry about the money as the Branch receives the same amount per member regardless of the method used to renew.
